Each year National PTA publishes a public policy agenda that outlines policy priorities and recommendations for Congress. The priorities are selected based on the following criteria: timeliness of issue (is it being considered before Congress and the Administration), opportunities for National PTA to provide leadership and expertise to Congress, alignment to National PTA's mission and resolutions, and ability to achieve a meaningful policy change that will produce positive results for children and their families.

The **2011 Public Policy Agenda** focuses on two key priorities:

- Family Engagement in Education

- Opportunity and Equity for all Children.



The work to advance the Family Engagement in Education Act (HR1821/S941) continues. The bill currently enjoys 17 official House cosponsors and two official Senate cosponsors. The National PTA continues to advocate for and has as a very high priority the passage of the Elementary Secondary Education Act (ESEA). The Obama administration recently announced the release of the ESEA Flexibility package to provide State Educational Agencies regulatory relief from key provisions of ESEA-No Child Left Behind (NCLB). Waivers will be approved in exchange for implementation (or plans to implement) statewide reforms in

three areas:

- Adoption of college and career ready standards
- State-developed differentiated recognition, accountability and support
- Rigorous Teacher/principal Evaluation

State Superintendent Tony Evers and Governor Scott Walker are leading a team to develop a state-wide school accountability system which will set standards, include the use of multiple measures to evaluate student progress data, and include options to help those schools who cannot reach standards. Our WI State PTA president is a member of the design team. We will have to wait and see if the design team will be able to lead the state into compliance with Federal requirements that would allow the state to qualify for the Federal Waiver

Call for Resolutions ~ Call to Rescind

Now is the time for local PTA and PTSA units and councils to thinking about and submitting resolutions that they want to be considered at the Wisconsin PTA State Convention in April. It is also time for all of us to take a look at what we have on the books and submit items to rescind.

Resolutions are the written proposals which express concerns of a submitting unit or council. The resolutions ask for a specific action or actions on the part of the State PTA and its constituent members, to

address problems, concerns or situations that affect children and youth statewide.



Rescinding is the legal action needed to retire a resolution currently included in Wisconsin PTA's basic policy and legislative program. Each important item was a motion that WI PTA's general membership voted upon and passed to reflect the views of the time. Items in these documents that are outdated, are no longer relevant or appropriate can be submitted by units or councils for consideration to be rescinded.

Once rescinded items are retired but continue to be held in our historical records.

The deadline for submitting any of these items, for consideration at this year's convention, are due in the state office no later than January 13, 2012.

November 15th Deadline Looms

The November 15th tax filing deadline is fast approaching!

Be sure to file federal tax Form 990 before the due date.

All PTAs must file an IRS Form 990, postmarked no later than November 15th.

Penalty Provisions for Not Filing

For annual tax periods beginning after 2006, the law requires most tax-exempt organizations, to file

an annual 990 with the IRS. If an organization fails to file an annual return or submit a notice as required for 3 consecutive years, it will automatically lose its tax-exempt status. Form 990, 990EZ

Redesigned Form 990

As of 2010 if you have gross receipts of \$200,000 or less and total assets at the end of the tax year of less than \$500,000; you will file the form 990EZ.

When, where and how to file: File

form 990 by the 15th day of the fifth month after the organization's accounting period ends.

PTAs can file the Form 990 and related forms, schedules and attachments electronically. If you choose not to do the online form, mail your return to:

The Obama administration recently announced the release of a flexibility package to provide state educational agencies with regulatory relief from key provisions of the Elementary and Sec-

ondary Education Act-No Child Left Behind. All states and the District of Columbia can submit waiver requests to the Department of Education by **Monday, November 14**.

All PTAs are encouraged to visit ED.gov/esea/flexibility to review conditions, peer-review guidelines, applications, and frequently asked questions in support of ESEA flexibility.

The House Education and Workforce Committee Chairman John Kline (R-MN) introduced three targeted reauthorization bills, one of which has passed the full House (charter schools expansion). The next bill to be introduced is expected to be on accountability systems.

Over the years, many of our units have been extremely generous in providing us with a wide variety of great baskets and auction items, and we hope you'll be willing to do the same this year!

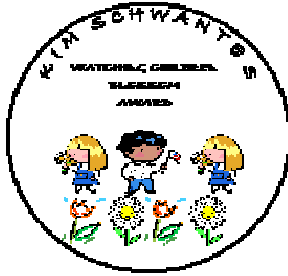
